2. Programme Aims & Overview

Aims

This programme trains students how to evaluate, through deep historical contextualisation, questions of society, power and politics. Students taking this programme will be taught a range of skills key to employment in the twenty-first century, including in analysing information, building arguments and presentation.

Overview

An innovative and interdisciplinary exploration of the ways that social, cultural, and political institutions, decisions, and events have shaped, and continue to shape, societies and nations across the world. Rather than focusing on chronology or strictly demarcated historical periods, combining history and politics facilitates explorations and analyses of key issues, controversies, themes, and debates.

Why study BA History with Politics at Goldsmiths?

BA History with Politics is an innovative and interdisciplinary exploration into how social, cultural, and political institutions, decisions, and events have shaped societies around the world. Rather than focusing on chronology or strictly demarcated historical periods, combining history and politics encourages and facilitates explorations and analyses of key issues, controversies, themes, and debates. The study, analysis and understanding of the past is as important today as it has ever been.

Understanding past societies fosters emotional intelligence and allows us to appreciate the diversity and adaptability of human life.

Understanding our pasts can help us to shape our futures and, crucially, help us shape those futures intelligently, insightfully, fairly, and with compassion, contributing towards equality, diversity and social justice.

Our innovative approaches to the study of politics, peel back the formal veneer of political parties and institutions to reveal the major ideological, economic, social, and cultural conflicts

By exploring politics in this in-depth manner, you will gain a comprehensive understanding of our world.

We cross boundaries between the traditional and the more radical understandings of political phenomena.

Politics is much more than simply what happens in parliaments, it pervades the whole of society, domestically and internationally.

Programme Structure: BA History with Politics

In each year (full-time), you will take modules worth 120 credits. Where options are available, choices must take into consideration the need to take 60 credits of modules in each teaching term.

In your First Year, you will take four core modules with fellow BA History with Politics and BA History students giving you a broad insight into modern history and how we research the past: 'Historical Controversies'; 'Power, Emotions and Environment'; 'Global Connections: The Violence and Exchanges that Shaped the Modern World'. Additionally, because skills are such an important part of this programme, you will take the modules 'Reading and Writing History' and 'Academic Skills for the Social Sciences / Humanities'.

In your Second Year, you will choose two of the four History modules: 'Communication, Propaganda and Power'; 'Radicalism and Revolution'; 'Race, Bodies and Empire'; and 'Environment, Disease and the Anthropocene' and two of the four Politics modules: 'US Politics & Foreign Policy'; 'Global Governance and World Order'; 'Modern Britain: Politics from 1979 to Today'; 'Modern Political Theory'.

You will also take the core modules 'History at Work' and 'The Goldsmiths Project' and choose two modules from options provided by the History Department. These optional modules, together worth 30 credits, can be replaced by modules in another discipline in Goldsmiths.

In your Third Year, you will take the core modules: 'Special Subject Dissertation' and 'Researching and Writing: Crafting and Presenting Your Work' along with one History Special Subject topical module at Goldsmiths (60 credits in total). Alternatively, you will take one Special Subject module worth 60 credits from a list of University of London intercollegiate Group III modules.

You will also take the core module 'Future Histories: Skills for the Twenty-First Century' and choose 45 credits of modules from a list of History and Politics options, taking at least 30 credits of Politics modules within this total. Beyond that stipulation, 15 credits of optional History or Politics modules can be replaced by a module in another discipline in Goldsmiths.

8. Learning, Teaching & Assessment

Learning & Teaching methods

Teaching will be via a range of formats to be as relevant as possible to the topic and learning outcomes. This may be through workshops, practical labs, lectures and seminars. It may have a mix of in-person and online activities, designed to give you the best learning experience and to make the most out of your time on campus. You are expected to attend all your timetabled learning activities.

Specifically, this programme will be taught in the following ways:

Core teaching methods include interactive lectures and in-depth seminars, where students critically discuss primary sources, key theories and debates. The curriculum is structured around a combination of thematic modules, which link historical context with contemporary political challenges, and period-specific courses to build foundational knowledge. The program is designed to cultivate essential 21st century skills such as critical thinking, complex problem-solving, and effective communication through collaborative assignments and reasoned debate. It incorporates practical skills development, such as research design and advanced academic writing, culminating in a final-year, special subject dissertation where you will undertake independent, original research under individual supervision.

Assessment modes and approaches

You will be assessed in a range of ways throughout your course. These will be both Formative (for feedback and development), and Summative (required to pass and progress to the next level). Summative assessments are compulsory.

Feedback is a crucial part of your learning and development in this programme. You will receive feedback both on your Formative (work in progress) tasks/assessments, and your Summative (graded) assessments. This feedback will help the assessment to be a part of your learning, not just a test. It may be verbal, written or video based. Please engage with this feedback to improve your future work.

Specifically, this programme will be assessed in the following ways:

You will demonstrate your analytical and research abilities through various forms of written coursework, including traditional and non-traditional essays and more focused reading critiques where you engage deeply with academic sources as well as sat examinations. Oral presentations and debates are used to develop your public speaking and communication skills. Some modules require the creation of portfolios, allowing you to curate a collection of reflective work, practical projects, or case studies that demonstrate continuous learning and skill development.
