Educational Studies at Goldsmiths: Some future career paths

The education sector is a challenging, rewarding and inspiring area in which to work. Many educators enjoy their work because of the great satisfaction that comes from being passionate about their subject and transmitting that passion to others. Educators are usually very people-oriented and derive a lot of pleasure from seeing their students learn and develop.

A degree in Educational Studies from Goldsmiths prepares you for a career in teaching. However, it also opens up a wide range of other careers because of the skills that you develop during the programme of study. These include creative thinking, active listening, clarity of communication, planning ahead and effective organisation, to name a few. These are all attractive to employers.

The education sector can be divided into three main areas:

- school education
- further education (FE)
- higher education (HE)

Teaching is the main area of work. There are also teaching-related roles such as teaching assistants and educational psychologists, as well as positions in areas such as policy making, administration and technical support.

Many Educational Studies graduates also use their skills and knowledge in areas such as community arts/education, the police and probation services, youth/social work and charities.

What do Goldsmiths Educational Studies graduates do?¹

The majority (78.4%) of Educational Studies graduates of 2014 were in full-time work six months after graduating.
