Further study

A significant number of Goldsmiths History graduates (23.6% in 20141) go into further study after their undergraduate degrees. Some examples are: ¹

- GDL (Graduate Diploma in Law)
- TEFL (Teaching English as a Foreign Language)
- Research degree, eg MPhil Gender Studies

What skills will I gain?

Studying History and combined subjects at Goldsmiths will help you develop a number of skills highly sought by graduate employers:

- analytical skills
- the ability and confidence to think critically and independently
- experience in research and gathering insights from a range of subjects
- the ability to express ideas clearly, both in writing and speech

What kinds of graduate employers might be interested in me?

As you can see, Goldsmiths history graduates develop a variety of skills that can be applied to a wide number of different employment sectors. History provides a good foundation for a number of careers, notably in teaching, law, the cultural and heritage sectors and media. Equally, history graduates are well equipped for business, politics, journalism and social research.

Central and local government

Cultural sector

Your history degree puts you in a strong position for roles in the cultural sector such as curator, conservator, archivist, gallery assistant. You would need to take further qualifications to enter some of these roles.

Education

This includes teaching positions in primary and secondary schools, for which you will need a postgraduate qualification; or you may be interested in the Higher Education sector for which you would normally need a PhD.

Information management

These roles include academic and community librarian; information officer in commercial organisations, law firms, and the not-for-profit sector; information provider in political parties or the NHS.

Social research organisations and think tanks

The biggest employer is the Government Social Research Service (GSR) where you could be working on anything from community cohesion to gender equality. There are other organisations in this field of work ranging from university-based research institutes to think tanks and consultancies. civilservice.gov.uk/networks/gsr
