Music at Goldsmiths: Some future career paths

Goldsmiths' Department of Music is hugely varied, and former students have equally diverse lives - from classical musicians and Mercury Prize-winning pop stars, to lawyers, academics and administrators.

What do Music graduates do?

The skills and experience gained during the programme allow graduates to enter the Music industry or any field requiring imagination and communication - including teaching, sales, management, journalism, publishing, public relations and work in the IT sector.

A sizeable proportion of Goldsmiths Music graduates (23.8% in 2014) go on to further study after their undergraduate course, on programmes such as¹:

- MMus Creative Practice
- MA: Orchestral Artistry; Music, Mind and Brain
- Teaching: through PGCE, SCITT and Teach First

What skills will I gain?

Goldsmiths Music graduates develop a wide range of key skills through both the practical and academic content of their degree, including:

- communication (including public speaking, developing and presenting an argument, note taking, report writing)
- analytical thinking
- awareness of social, political and cultural processes
- · awareness of social and cultural difference
- ability to take creative approaches
- attention to detail
- team work and collaborative practice
- the ability to undertake detailed research

Graduates also develop specific musical skills including:

- performance
- composition
- use of music technology
- knowledge of a range of historical, contemporary, popular and world styles of music, and the debates and practices surrounding them
- critical listening and score analysis

Areas of work

The choice of areas of work for Music graduates is vast - performing (in orchestras, bands, and as session musicians), composing (for ensembles, film, TV, radio or as songwriters), producing, engineering and teaching. Many also go on to work in supporting



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roles in arts administration, event organisation, music marketing, management and PR; and with further qualifications can go into music therapy, music law and music librarianship and archiving.

The creative industries are competitive to enter, and Goldsmiths Music graduates develop the necessary skills and attitudes to be motivated self-starters and autonomous entrepreneurs. A significant number of professional musicians go on to have portfolio careers or become self-employed - blending a number of jobs and roles to create for themselves a dynamic and diverse working life that caters to a number of their interests.

How will the Music Department support me?

The department operates a Professional Practice Scheme that supports students with their future careers and employability. The Scheme includes masterclasses with industry professionals, skills training, CV development, and the chance for creative work to be reviewed by professionals.
